PROGRAMMES

Our approach is 'helping people help themselves' by making the disadvantaged self-reliant and enabling them to lead a life of dignity. This philosophy lays the foundation for our work on the ground. The following are highlights of a few of our programs in this year.

A School for Special Children (Hyderabad)

A residential school for children with intellectual challenges, the school is really a safe haven for its beneficiaries who have a range of conditions like cerebral palsy, autism, mental retardation, epilepsy, speech impairment and others. The school works towards developing these children so that they can be mainstreamed to the maximum extent possible. They are trained in aspects



like development of their motor-skills, self-help skills for daily living, academic skills, language skills and prevocational skills. Counselling is provided to their families as well. Following the guidelines of the Institute of Mental Health, the curriculum is adapted to suit each child's needs.

Livelihood Improvement Project through Integrated Watershed Management in Rural Odisha

Our supported watershed programme in rural Odisha was implemented in 3 Gram Panchayats (GP) of 2 blocks, covering 13 villages of Cuttack district. With this project, a redundant water harvesting structure (which used to remain dry for 8 months of the year), was restored such that it now yields water for irrigation of 600 acres of paddy fields and 100 acres of vegetable farms throughout the year. Due to this, 650 farmers will be able to avail of a double crop in the year. Along with this, two village ponds were cleaned and changing rooms were constructed on their banks for women to use. The strength of the project lies in its adoption of a participatory watershed management approach. Village level user groups were formed to execute activities at the local



level while GP level watershed committees were formed to support the maintenance of the water harvesting structure and the ponds. Importantly, the villagers received extensive awareness and training on the restored water bodies and the importance of taking ownership of them and maintaining them in order to receive long-term benefits which will lead to improved incomes.





Integrated Health & Hygiene intervention at Kolgaon & Nandore, Palghar, (Maharashtra)

The project adopted a holistic approach towards improvement of the health conditions of the communities of Nandore and Kolgaon villages (Palghar). Efforts were made to bridge the gap of health services available and to educate the community with basic, simple knowledge which could bring about long-term change. The activities conducted included health awareness sessions for the community, providing kitchen garden support to families (particularly pregnant women) and support to the rural hospital in Palghar to deal with the unexpected pandemic. This was coupled with other activities such as training of the staff at the sub centre, anganwadi workers and ASHA workers at Nandore and Kolgaon. The health staff were also provided with health kits to perform their duties more efficiently. Adolescent girls in the community were provided with information on menstrual health and hygiene. This approach enabled the community and strengthened the existing health institutions.

Integrated Health & Hygiene intervention at Modgaon, Palghar (Maharashtra)

The population of Modgaon village depends primarily on agriculture for its survival. Communities are significantly marginalized here. Health facilities are poor with a lack of rudimentary information on basic

health and hygiene. This is coupled with poor health facilities in the vicinity. Modgaon has one sub centre which is in a dilapidated condition with minimum facilities. The population usually depends on a hospital for medical emergencies which is about35 kms away from the village. This has resulted in poor health conditions amongst all age groups.

Our supported project worked towards improvement in health standards, across communities, through education in the village, for a period of a year. Regular health camps, followed by referrals, health



awareness sessions for the community and sessions with children were conducted. Anganwadi workers and ASHA workers were provided with training on health issues and provided with a health kit. With the onset of the lockdown, the project was redesigned to work with self-help groups of women with a livelihood plan developed to support them with some means of sustaining themselves through the lockdown.

PROGRAMMES

School for Children with Visual Impairment and Multiple Disabilities (Delhi)

The programme runs a school for children with visual impairments and multiple disabilities and also reaches out to others in the community who cannot attend the school. It aims at providing early intervention services

and quality education to all its students, making the maximum use of technological innovations while doing so. Since the children have differing capacities and requirements, the program customizes its interventions with individualized programs designed to suit each child's unique needs and abilities to the maximum extent possible. Children who are confident and well prepared academically are integrated into mainstream schools and those who are not suited for these schools are provided functional education in all subjects and are enrolled in the National Institute of Open School (NIOS). Notably, the programme constantly works towards development of the children so that they can build up a sustainable future for themselves. It has facilitated jobs and income opportunities for many



of its students and given them the confidence to build up their own independent lives as adults

The programme is implemented in Rafiq Nagar, an area with close proximity to the huge dumping ground in Deonar (Mumbai). Families living in this area are socio-economically deprived and children are all-too-often school dropouts who have grown up making quick money as rag pickers or scrap dealers and do not understand the need for education. They are often subjected to social evils of child marriage, drug addiction, child labour, abuse and harassment.

To encourage children to pursuetheir education, the project runs academic sessions in the area and encourages youth to complete their education through the National Institute of Open School or through the SSC board. Additionally, children are provided nutrition, counselling, timely health check-ups and educational tours for their holistic development. Along with academic and psychological support, these adolescents are also equipped with life skills and grooming to equip them for the future.

Stop the spread of germs that can make you and others sick!




The aim of the activity was to create awareness using digital posters about health and hygiene in the community. WASH as a subject was imparted to the children and youth.

COVID19 Support & Intervention


Covid 19 has shaken the whole world and left people grappling to cope with the crisis.
